One time when I was a teenager my cousin and I were paging through a family album commenting on all the familiar characters who helped to form our family identity. We came to a photo of one man whose face I had never seen before. He was disheveled and appeared intoxicated; he looked like he might have been drunk a lot. I asked my cousin, whose mother was my mother's sister, "Is he from your dad's side?" She laughed. "No, our mothers'. Don't try to escape." It was a light conversation, but actually it is a good idea not to avoid the truth, to face what we can be proud of as well as what disappoints or gnaws at us in our families. But what if I would dig further? Would I find people who had committed atrocities at some in my family history? Would I discover greatness? Would it matter?

What about the history of our church family? Martin Luther and other reformers cut through tired Medieval values and made a profound impact on the church and western civilization. At the same time, Luther was an embarrassing anti-Semite. How does all of this impact our identities? We don't ignore it. However, who we are and how we live are not dependent on any other individual. In the waters of our baptism we find our identity in belonging to Christ. Baptism is powerful.
