How would you like to go sightseeing with Jesus? You say, "Wow, Jesus look at that building's architecture. The stones are magnificent." Jesus grunts, "It won't last. Do you see all those great buildings over there? Every stone will be thrown down." You ask, "When?" He doesn't even answer your question but responds with, "Better watch it. Don't be led astray."

What a Debby Downer Jesus was, at least to sightseers or the ones who wielded control within the edifices that would fall. However, the people who were cheated by powerful officials (beware of those in high places who "devour widows' houses"), heard Jesus' words differently. Samuel Cruz, says that many of those who constructed the buildings Jesus pointed to did not benefit from what was offered inside them. A change in structure all around – in the buildings and system – was good news.

ELCA Minister Venice Williams of Alice's Garden and The Table in Milwaukee recently gave an amazing talk about the power of food, the rich history of creativity and culinary skills in the black culture, and the history of that creativity being co-opted. White slave owners nabbed recipes from the black culture without respect for the chefs. Venice talked about magic in the kitchen and about how food is a bridge between diverse groups when it is shared and the cultures are respected and credited.

Co-opting happens when we want an individual's or a group's ideas, creativity, and labor but not them. We recognize co-opting on a small scale and also within entire systems that try to erase people and their stories. Don't be led astray and seduced within those structures, but we are. By grace we return from the seduction of narrow systems to a broader scenery of sharing and hope. Happy Monday!
