It is neither prudent nor kind to ignore the pressing issues at hand and leap ahead to some imagined future.

However, it is also true that real change, the kind that will address the underlying issues that disadvantage some in the first place, will not happen until current conditions become unbearable. Left to itself, every system will stay the same and continue to get exactly the results it is already getting.

We are part of a global capitalistic system that had spread to every corner of the planet, entangling every person and thing on it.
