Sex Trafficking: Public Hearing on Senate Bill 245,

also known as Safe Harbor. Thank you to Shirley Paulson (top left), retired educator and former president of the Women of the ELCA of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin for driving from the Green Bay area to testify. Safe Harbor would decriminalize youth under 18 caught in prostitution and treat them as victims of a crime and in need of services. At the hearing, there were several disturbing stories of trafficked youth afraid they would be charged with a crime if they called the police.

It sometimes takes many years to pass a bill. We have been supporting Safe Harbor for quite a few years now, but it is closer to passing. Thank you for everyone's past and future support! SB 245

Care for God's Creation:

The ELCA will again have a presence at the Conference of Parties (COP). LOPPW's director is grateful to be one of the participants during the second week of the two-week event.

Here is some info from the <u>COP 26 website</u>: "Around the world storms, floods and wildfires are intensifying. Air pollution sadly affects the health of tens of millions of people and unpredictable weather causes untold damage to homes and livelihoods too. But while the impacts of climate change are devastating, advances in tackling it are leading to cleaner air, creating good jobs, restoring nature and at the same time unleashing economic growth.

Despite the opportunities we are not acting fast enough. To avert this crisis, countries need to join forces urgently.

In November, the UK, together with our partner Italy, will host an event many believe to be the world's last best chance to get runaway climate change under control. For nearly three decades the UN has been bringing together almost every country on earth for global climate summits - called COPs - which stands for 'Conference of the Parties'. 'In that time climate change has gone from being a fringe issue to a global priority. This year will be the 26th annual summit – giving it the name COP26. With he UK as President, COP26 takes place in Glasgow.

In the run up to COP26 the UK is working with every nation to reach agreement on how to tackle climate change. More than 190 world leaders are expected to arrive in Scotland. Together with tens of thousands of negotiators, government representatives, businesses and citizens for twelve days of talks. Not only is it a huge task but it is also not just yet another international summit. Most experts believe COP26 has a particular urgency..."
