Info for an Interfaith Advocacy Day on Climate and Hunger Coming Soon. The event will focus on the Governor's 2023-25 Biennial State Budget. Agencies have already submitted their budget requests, which the governor and his team will discern when writing the budget. After Wisconsinites lift their voices in the spring via advocacy events, individual contacts with legislators, and feedback to the joint finance committee via email and/or at public hearings, the joint finance committee will decide how to edit the budget before presenting it to the full legislature. After the legislature also works and votes on the budget, it will go back to

Governor Evers to sign. As many faith and secular leaders have proclaimed, "Budgets are moral documents." Our voices are needed!

Faith Leaders' Presence at COP27

For several years, faith leaders have been advocating for world leaders at the UN Conference of Parties (COP) to create a fund for losses and damages caused by climate change. The wealthiest countries are most responsible for greenhouse gas emissions that have caused damages in impoverished countries that are least responsible for climate change. The COPs have focused on the mitigation of climate change and adaptation, the latter of which is about making preparations to adapt to future damages from storms, flooding, droughts, etc. that are inevitable results of our climate crisis. This year, a decision was made to create a Loss and Damages fund!
