Money in Politics doesn't buy elections, it buys access.

According to the Center for Responsive Politics, in 9 out of 10 congressional elections the candidate that spends more wins.

As of the end of February Super PACs had raised \$389 million to spend on the primary elections.

This past fall the Wisconsin State Legislature voted to disband the non-partisan Government Accountability Board and loosened campaign finance rules.

Terms to Know

Lobbying: The process of influencing public and government policy at all levels: federal, state, and local.

Special Interest Group: An association of individuals or organizations with shared concerns that attempts to influence public policy.

Political Action Committee (PAC): A political committee created for the purpose of raising and spending money to elect or defeat candidates

Redistricting: The process of drawing new electoral district boundaries in order to make districts have the same population.

Gerrymandering: The drawing of constituency boundaries in a way that a certain party will win more seats than its opponent

Citizens United: A case decided in 2010 by the Supreme Court which opened the door for uncapped spending in elections as long as there was no direct coordination with a candidate
